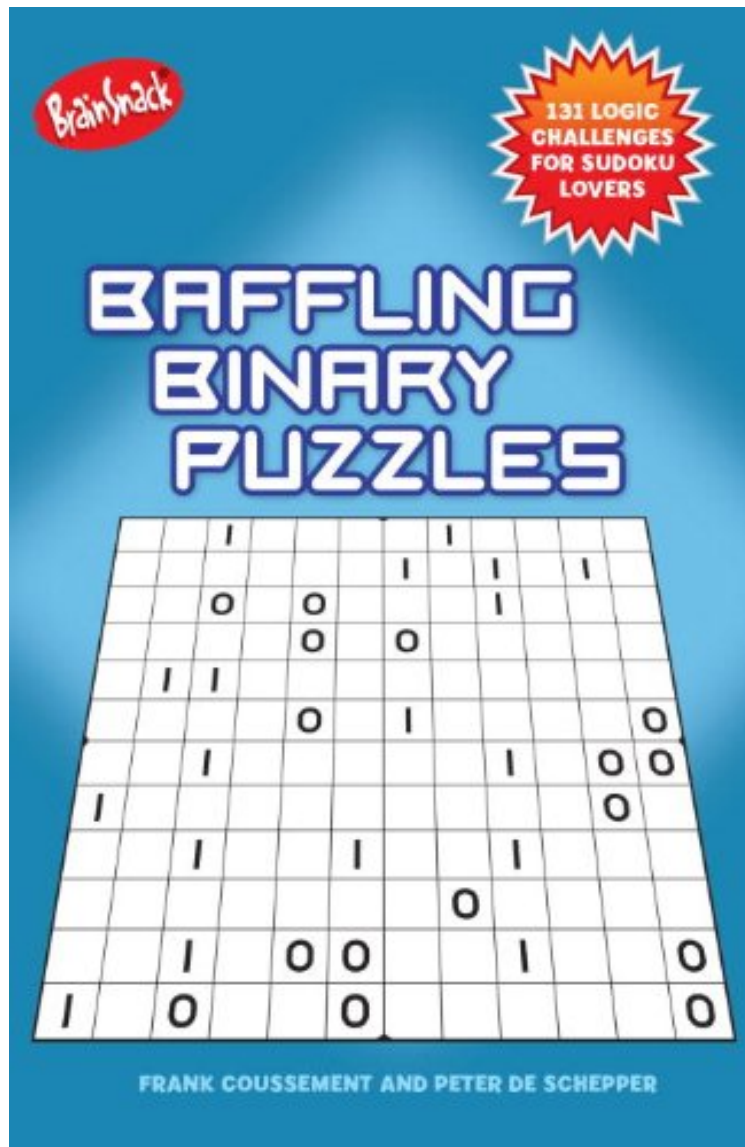

Hall This book presents a unique, devious take on Sudoku-like fill-in puzzles. A true "binary" Sudoku would be 2x2 and of limited interest, while this species is more complex, but still only requires ones and zeroes. Then again, minimalists will like having only three short rules of play. The authors have filled a book with a subtle Sudoku variation that I find more satisfying than base-ten Sudoku because it feels like an accomplishment to complete them. Like any good puzzle genre, these are arranged in escalating difficulty with enough easy ones to build skill and confidence, and enough hard ones to tax your brain. I am giving copies of this book to my grown sons who both have tried pages from my copy and found it as interesting as I have. Beginners can finish the early pages in short order, yet after weeks I am still sweating the later pages. Well done. I hope more volumes are in the works.

Take two numbers, that is! All you need to solve these tricky and entertaining binary puzzles are 0, 1, and a little cleverness. The aim is to fill in the grid with zeros and ones until there are an equal number of each in every row and every column. But no more than two of the same number can be next to or under each other, and no two rows or columns can look exactly alike. Each puzzle has only one correct solution and there's an explanation of all the strategies that will turn newcomers into masters. Start with the easier ones, and as your skills increase, tackle the super-challenges. Puzzle lovers will find BINARY a brilliant new spin on Sudoku!
