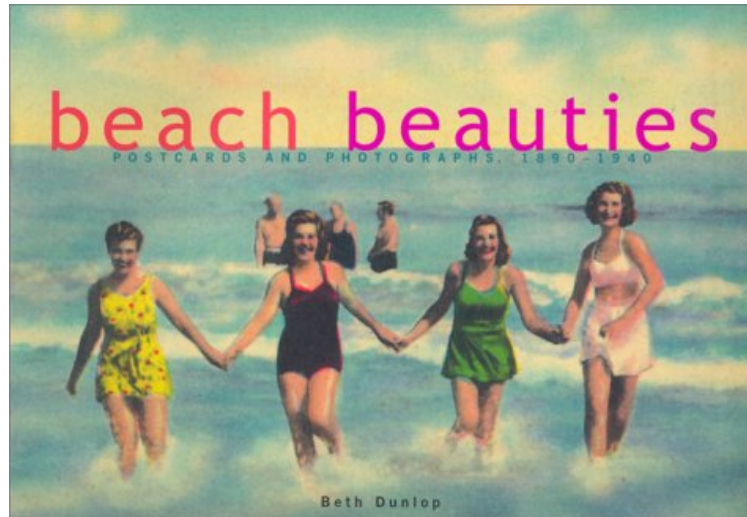


(Get free) Beach Beauties: Postcards and Photographs, 1890-1940
