Beware the Kindle edition! Here is my post on the everymanchess.com (publisher) Forum (not yet approved by their admins): No index of variations! This is a very disappointing omission. The first thing I noticed about the e-version was that it had no page numbers. I learned to live with that, but why? Wouldn't it be easier to have 2 identical versions, paper and electronic, so that updates would be easier? But the more serious problem is that the index of variations, as published in the paper books, would not make sense in an e-book with no pages. Actually, if I had an image of the index of variations from the paper book, I think I could use that to navigate the e-book, trying to translate page numbers to whatever file offsets they use in e-books. Can anyone provide me with such a page? I don't blame Neil McDonald, who is a fine author. But who in Everyman Chess makes decisions like this? Someone who does not understand how chess players use opening books? I could order a paper version, but I have already paid for the book!!! Help!!! 2 of 6 people found the following review helpful. What happened to the main line? By anthroguy The most serious issue with the Kindle and hardcopy editions is that an entire chapter seems to have been omitted! The line 7 . . . Qe8 is one of the three main lines of the Dutch, and is currently (as McDonald remarks) possibly the most popular. But he doesn't mention it further, nor explain why it is missing.
