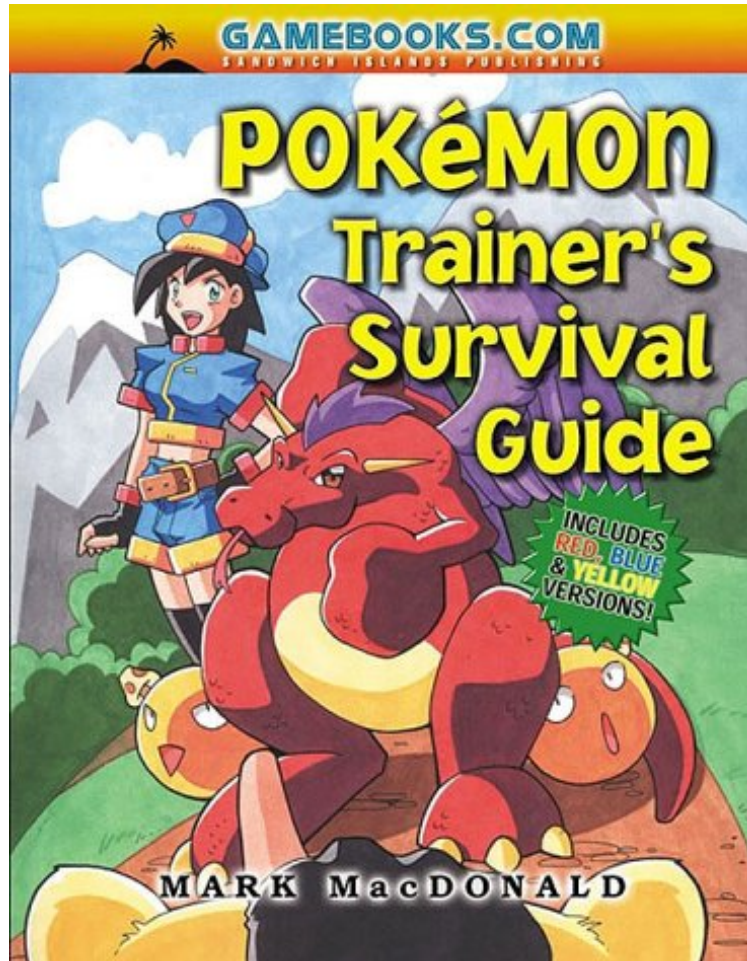

I did catch a couple of errors (Anyone else notice their picture of Raticate looks a lot like the Raichu on the previous page?). Since this guide only covers Red, Yellow, and Blue, i fully expected them to only cover the original 152 (including Mew and Missingno, the latter of whom is NOT covered).I did like the fact that they included a list of Pokemon that are in the different areas, which was one of the main reasons I purchased this guide (I usually go through GameFAQs; the Pokemon games seemed overly complex for something like that, though.)The version I had included the Trading Card Game and Pokemon Snap, which I don't intend to use. (I don't play the TCG or Snap, so...) They even had an episode guide to the first 55

episodes and first movie (which they erroneously labeled as a "Cartoon Episode Guide") although the movie guide was speculating about more movies coming (There are 19 movies as of September 2016.) Overall, a dated guide, some inaccuracies, but a decent find for \$4 (one cent for the guide, the rest for shipping). 0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. I keep getting the wrong one! By alamedyang (This review is based on the old version of this book, before inclusion of Yellow information.) As other reviewers of this book noted, it's not the best guide to Pokemon Red and Blue out there -- the walkthrough is choppy, the layout is amateurish, the translation is holey, and it could've had more information. However, it has two great redeeming qualities (at least in my eyes) that no other book can offer -- the reasons for me buying the book at all: 1) It contains information for Japanese versions, which I happen to own. (This may be a handicap for everyone else, it was a strength for me.) More specifically, it contains monster location information for the "3rd cart" (which isn't Yellow, by the way), aka the nonexistent "English Green", or the Japanese Blue version -- plus a map to Mewtwo for the Japanese Green and Red carts. (The Japanese Blue cart actually uses the American map!) 2) It has actual percentages for monster locations, not just the unhelpful "common" versus "rare" that other books use, for each of the three versions. This way, I can check exact probability and decide which version to catch the monster in (and then trade to the other). These two strengths only rate it three stars because the rest of the weaknesses are just too bad, especially in the translation department -- some Pokemon names are left in Japanese (Rakki for Chansey, Spectre for Haunter, Tamatama for Exeggcute, etc.) -- and the mechanics department: Where the versions differ for trading and other aspects of gameplay, only one version's information is presented, not all of them. Plus, I would have liked a PokeDex by number and not by name (it could have a name-to-number conversion chart to compensate), an item function chart, and an explanation of each attack move.... for things like these, other guides are far better.
