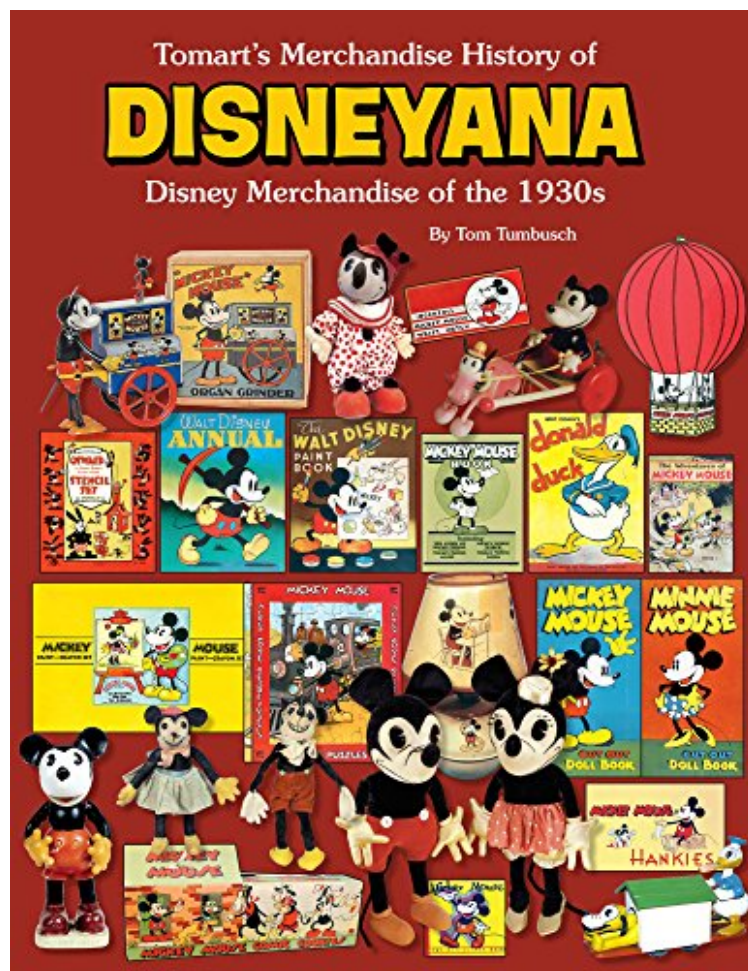


Tomart Merchandise History of DISNEYANA: Merchandise of the 1930s
