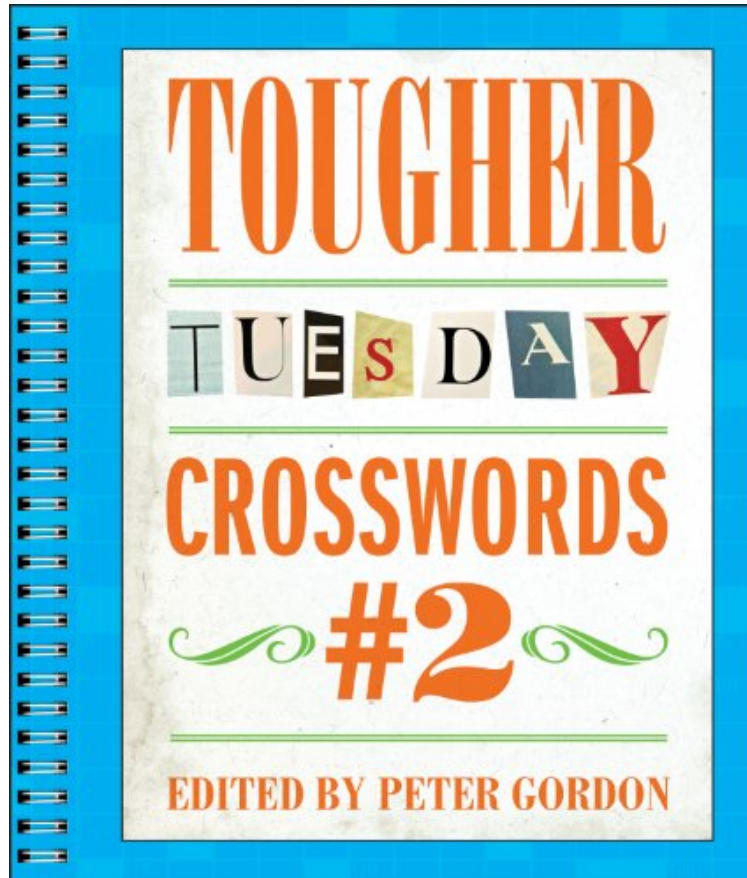


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Tougher Tuesday Crosswords #2

I think theses are more like NY Times Wednesdays. The spiral binding, 72 puzzles per book, good paper and print quality are all good features. Most of all, the themes and vocabulary are fresher and more fun than the NY Times, which get a bit repetitive, in my opinion.

Take time out on Tuesday to tackle tricky brainteasers. These tough (but not too tough) crosswords will keep you on your toes and focused. While the clues aren't giveaways, there's nothing here you can't handle, and the engaging themes include X-Spelled, Naval Maneuvers, Identity Theft, and Take a Load Off."
